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# Bird of the Season - Scarlet Tanager Copy by Stuart Tordoff

Many of our visitors entering the woods from the Wyke end never stray beyond Judy Bridge and so are unaware of the delights of the woods beyond. Those visitors who enter the woods from the Shelf end will probably do so by walking down Bridle Stile from Halifax Road. Off Bridle Stile is a quiet cul-de-sac called Bridle Dene. If you had walked down that way in mid-November you would perhaps have wondered why the place was overrun by twitchers (keen bird watchers) with their binoculars and spotting scopes - it was reported that several hundred people, from all parts of the UK, had descended on that spot over a few days. The answer was to see a bird that had been blown off course from its migratory course from the north to the south of the USA - a scarlet tanager. This sighting was only the 9th record of the bird being spotted in this country and the news made local and national TV. Although the male bird is scarlet when breeding, juveniles and females are yellow and this example was yellow. Being so close to Judy Woods it's not too fanciful to think that perhaps the bird did visit our woods and so we're claiming it as our bird of the season!

### Bat Walk - Led by Sally Tetlow, Report by Sally Tetlow

Our walk this year followed on from a beautiful sunny afternoon which boded well for a good showing of bats and we weren't disappointed. Ian Butterfield gave his usual introductory talk to an assembled audience of over 50 participants. It was wonderful to have such a good turnout and even more rewarding to see so many enthusiastic youngsters amongst this number. We then assembled to commence our walk with Ian distributing his bat detectors so that these could be tuned into the appropriate frequency for detecting particular species. Our walk took us into the woods through the Meadway entrance and as we worked our way around our route, we were rewarded at various points with good sightings of both pipistrelle and soprano pipistrelle bats. This produced gasps of delight from all particularly as some of these 'fly-pasts' were low! Towards the end of our walk one of our eagle-eyed youngsters spotted a toad on the pathway, which was moved to the safety of some leaf litter. An excellent evening particularly as the weather conditions were in our favour for once.

## Fungi Walk - Led by Sally Tetlow, report by Sally Tetlow

What a glorious autumn day it was for our annual fungi foray. Our group of 20 met our leaders, John Gavaghan and Nick Kirby, at the top of Sowden Lane in Norwood Green to commence our foray. We were also joined by 2 eagle-eyed youngsters who proved extremely adept at locating a range of finds to challenge our experts. The lane itself provided much to discuss before we even reached the woods. I listed in excess of 25 species over the course of our foray, 2 of which were new to John these being golden scalycap and trumpet chanterelle. Amongst our other finds were peeling oysterling, porcelain fungus, sheathed woodtuft, shaggy scalycap, hebeloma, fly agaric, ochre brittlegill and a range of brackets and crusts. The woods looked beautiful in the autumn sunshine showing off the changing colours of the trees to perfection. It was agreed by all that it had been an immensely satisfying few hours with much having been learnt about the fascinating world of this much under-appreciated and misunderstood facet of our natural world.

#### Autumn Leaf Blowing.

It is that time of the year again when the leaves are coming down like confetti potentially making paths and steps slippery and hazardous. Stuart D brought his powerful leaf blower over in mid November and with a bit of minimal help from Tony & Ian cleared the leaves from the path & steps down to Judy bridge. Also the path from Judy bridge to the foot of the 99 steps, the 99 steps, and most of the main path from the 5 bend to the entrance kissing gate. It is a powerful machine and expertly operated impressive results. It took one person a whole morning a couple of years ago to clear the 99 steps, it took Stuart 12 minutes.

### River Fly Survey

Mary, Geoff & Sally have ben involved with the River Fly Survey, the count and water quality have been deemed satisfactory, i.e. had met the indicator levels. Mary & Geoff attended a meeting at Calderdale Rivers Trust where, although the fly count was OK, it was not as high as other teams, however our attendance was 100% along with 4 other groups. Although our beck may not be as clean and consequently the fly species not as diverse, as least we were sufficiently keen to ensure that the tests were conducted as per the prescribed protocol.

#### Mr John Chege Death & Inquest

The inquest relating to the death of John Chege, took place in mid November. This sad event was documented in the previous newsletter, as some members of the PTG were involved in the search for Mr Chege. It appears that he had recently returned from Kenya and "he had changed, and was not himself" he was also having some medical issues, a change of medication and some employment changes at work, where he was a pharmacist. The Assistant Coroner, Caroline Chandler, deemed that Mr Chege had taken his own life and "on the balance of probabilities he died as a deliberate act and intended for it to be fatal".

# Unblocking the Culvert

The culvert in the farmers field up from the far kissing gate was partially blocked again, four members of the heavy gang eventually succeeded in the unblocking. One worker, who shall remain nameless, was stripped to the waist with his full arm down the culvert to remove the debris that was blocking the entrance. A selfless act of dedication consistent with the high work ethic standards of the PTG.

#### A Late Growth Spurt

Subsequent to the July Balsam Bash Saturday, the dreaded plant had a late flowering and growth spurt. Further concentrated efforts were carried out close to the pylons and in particular many Station Road members gathered at the Woodside end to attack a field of balsam. The quantity was overwhelming but we had some success. A more concentrated effort next season might show some improvement.

#### Stuart Davis Joins the Committee

At the latest committee meeting, Stuart Davis came along as an observer and was invited to join the committee, he was proposed and seconded, so welcome Stuart.

Mentioned in the July newsletter, the gate into Judy's garden was vandalised and the council took responsibility for the replacement, the job has been completed, sourced and fitted and looks good. Thanks again to Peter W and his team.

#### The Wrong Sleeper

Denis and his team found a wooden railway sleeper and, with some difficulty, as it was located in an awkward place next to the beck, was retrieved. It was initially presumed it was from the mineral line but in fact on retrieval it transpires that it is a full size sleeper and due to the location and spacing of the holes is consistent with standard gauge.

#### A Bridge - So Far

A plank bridge on the perimeter path was getting dangerous so it was decided to replace it with 2 new railway sleepers. This was accomplished in 2 stages: week one, taking the sleepers over to the site from the container area, and week two removing the existing damaged planks and fitting the new ones. A third stage will be completed when a thick wire mesh, supplied by Stuart T, is fitted to the surface of the planks to prevent slipping on the wet or leaf-covered surface.
