(Lady) Bird of the Season

In a departure from our usual feature on local birdlife, we are showcasing a local friend whom John and Brian recently adopted during their outing in the woods. While entirely different in appearance, the larvae represent the juvenile stage of the ladybird, a beneficial insect renowned for its habit of eating aphids. A very welcome resident in Judy Woods, they differ substantially from adult ladybirds in appearance, featuring a more elongated body, a black or dark grey colour, and often orange markings. The larvae pass through four stages before pupating in August to overwinter and emerge in spring as adult ladybirds.



Practical Task Group Activities

1 Beech Sapling Removal



Beech tree management involves a range of duties, including the regular removal of saplings to promote a more diverse undergrowth and improved light penetration. Our original method of sapling removal proved very labour-intensive with minimal success. A recent purchase of a "Tree Removal Extractor" provided a significantly improved method of removal, resulting in considerable savings in labour time. The woodland dappled picture shows one of our younger members demonstrating the successful application of the extractor, whereby correct application and technique were more beneficial than brute strength alone. We are so pleased with


the results that we have agreed to purchase a larger "Extractor" to deal with the more resilient beech saplings.

2 New Seating

Events Report

1 Cromwell Bottom LNR

On April 15th, the FoJW were pleased to be invited to visit Cromwell Bottom Local Nature Reserve (LNR), which spans 76 acres of diverse habitat restored from a former quarry and landfill site. Nestled in the River Calder Valley, it now comprises a mix of woodland, wetlands, and grasslands that are abundant with plants and wildlife. It is regarded as one of the most significant wildlife sites in Calderdale, providing a vital habitat for a diverse range of insects, birds, and mammals. The LNR representatives led us



through a selected 2.5 miles of this attractive woodland reserve with ample opportunity to observe their working practices and, in particular, their extensive information displays and support facilities. At the end of the walk, we retired to their very welcome tea rooms for refreshments. The visitor numbers they achieved, along with the attendant self-funding raised and the support from Calderdale Council, made us quite envious of the facilities and equipment they had available. A great thank you to Cromwell Bottom for their invitation and access to the LNR.

2 Thursday 8th May, Walk to Lightcliffe Tea Rooms

We were so lucky with the weather for what has become our annual walk to Lightcliffe Tea Rooms.
