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You're more likely to hear a jay in the woods rather than see one but if you do spot one it's very likely that you'll note the white rump of this colourful bird as it flies away from you - they usually see you before you see them. Their loud harsh alarm call can be heard throughout the year but Spring is probably the best time as the birds will be making themselves heard as they look for mates. Members of the crow family, jays are slightly bigger than blackbirds, and reasonably common in our woods. Jays are renowned for their love of acorns which they cache during autumn to see them through the winter.

We suggested in our last newsletter that you keep a lookout for waxwings, especially in supermarket car parks. Those of you lucky to be around Tesco's on Halifax Road last month might have caught sight of these exotic-looking birds as they stripped the berries from the rowan trees.

Fire Safety Notice

The council had received a complaint from a member of the public relating to a fire notice placed close to the junction of the main path and High Fernley Road. The edges of the notice were sharp and it was considered that they could be a danger to the public. The screws were long and difficult to remove. It was satisfactorily relocated to a prominent position close to the "Poo Bins". The use of some sandpaper to smooth the edges and corners was also thought to be a sensible refinement.

LitterLotto

Liz Parker the Bradford South Area Ward Officer has asked us to promote the Litter Lotto scheme, their website litterlotto.com states as follows:-

The Litter Lotto is a scheme funded by businesses such as McDonald's to help create a clean environment by trying to change people's behaviour and opinions of litter and is supported by Bradford Council. The scheme is app based and it works by rewarding users with spot prizes and a weekly jackpot of £1000. The app is free to download using their QR code or through Google Play Store/Apple Store. Spot prizes are awarded as coins or cash rewards and the weekly jackpot is £1000. For every piece of litter binned in Bradford, the user will receive a double entry into the weekly jackpot. The more litter binned, the greater the chance of winning a prize or the jackpot. All people have to do is take a photo binning their litter.

There are currently 250 users across the district, but they need more people to get involved. They want us to promote the app. They will be trying to get people onto the app themselves at clean up sessions etc. Once the app has been downloaded, do the following:-

Pick up a piece of litter and open the app.

Take a photo as you put the litter in the bin,

Submit your entry.

Wait to see if you've won a prize!

A chance to encourage litter picking and be rewarded!



Grey Squirrels

In the last few weeks we have been again aware of squirrel activity, much more evident than at other times of the year. They are often seen in small groups rather than as individuals. Early February is of course mating time hence more sightings. Gestation period for squirrels is six weeks or so, the babies are called kits - useful to know if it ever comes up in your pub quiz.

Fencing

The rustic fence leading down towards Judy bridge has been damaged again. It was decided to replace it with conventional fencing. We have sufficient materials to complete this task so a new post and two rails have already been fitted, the rest will be done soon, weather and manpower permitting.

Kissing Gate Fence

As mentioned once again in the last newsletter the fence adjacent to the kissing gate had been replaced. This has again been vandalised. The post has been pulled out of the ground and rails removed, the perpetrators seem to be very persistent in their criminal damage activities.

Feed / Seed the Robins

Robins have territories in many areas of the woods and when we are working, any disturbance of the ground will attract a robin as they are on the lookout for any worms and bugs that we uncover during our work. PTG coordinator, Brian, has taken to bring bird food which interests them even more. Robins are very possessive of their territories, even the female has a territory of her own in winter. The male marks out the boundaries of his territory by singing loudly, especially in the spring. Males will fight fiercely with one another to defend their territories, sometimes to the death. Their endearing nature to us hides a more sinister side.



Beck Diversion

A beck diversion to the left of the Station Road kissing gate entrance was creating a pond, it is now back on course. It was difficult to accomplish as a fallen tree prevented access.

We requested some more sleepers to complete the project and eight more sleepers were duly delivered. These, we discovered, were slightly smaller than the previous ones but still adequate for the job. We are in the process of installing these and, when completed, the steps will be much safer.
